Senior Soup and Sandwich Program

"The Senior Soup and Sandwich was the best thing," a client said, "I was having a rough morning but my lunch was so good that it turned my whole day around," a client shared with our front desk.

Sometimes all it takes is a hot bowl of homemade soup and a gourmet sandwich to turn somebody's day around.

That's what happened recently to a Helpline House client who was having a rough morning until she picked up her free lunch through the new Helpline House Senior Soup and Sandwich Program.

"She called in and said it was the best thing!" said Helpline House Food Bank Manager Lianne Ristow.

"This program has been quite popular," Lianne shared.

Funded through a Kitsap County grant, the Helpline House program provides forty free lunches on a first-come, first-serve basis to seniors every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. The program started in November and is expected to continue through June. At a rate of 160 meals four days a week, that adds up to more than 4,000 free lunches!

Recipients over 60 years of age are encouraged to pick up their lunches early at Helpline House during regular business hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. "People start showing up as soon as we open our doors," Lianne says, adding that they have run out of lunches a few times.


Helpline House hired Bainbridge Island Chef Tim Shelly to help get the program off the ground, and he's been cooking up creative meals ever since. He prepares the lunches each day using only fresh ingredients in the commercial kitchen space donated by St. Barnabas Episcopal Church. Among the most popular soups so far has been Potato Corn Chowder and Butternut Squash. And he has heard raves about his hand-crafted Turkey Pesto and Caprese sandwiches.

As owner of Bainbridge Home Chef, Tim also caters for dinner parties and events, teaches cooking classes and cooks for other nonprofits on the Island. "I love to be able to do what I'm passionate about," Tim says. "This is a great way to do what I love and to give back."

Housing Solutions

Kitsap Community Resources' (KCR) Housing Solutions agent, Michelle, creates hope and opportunity for all low-income Kitsap County residents by providing resources that promote self-sufficiency and stability.

Every Tuesday at Helpline House, Michelle assesses and helps at-risk community members, making connections to housing resources throughout the county, including emergency shelter, rental & deposit assistance, and/or landlord referral. She quickly shares the resources available in our county with scheduled or walk-in clients.

These free services are available to anyone seeking affordable housing options to get support and find an opportunity to thrive.




Relief for Our Older Neighbors

Life's challenges can feel overwhelming, especially when health struggles and caregiving responsibilities pile up. For an elderly couple like the Smith's*, facing multiple health crises can seem impossible to manage. Mrs. Smith's husband, a stroke survivor, depended on her as his primary caregiver. But when she was diagnosed with cancer and needed surgery and treatment, everything became even harder.

"The weight of caring for both my husband and myself felt unbearable", said Mrs. Smith. "That's when I turned to Helpline House, and their support made all the difference." Donna, the Helpline House Community Care Coordinator arranged transportation for Mrs. Smith's medical appointments and respite care for her husband, allowing Mrs. Smith to have much-needed breaks. Donna also helped them organize medications and keep track of important schedules.

"One of the most valuable services was the food deliveries from the local food bank," said Mrs. Smith. The power of neighbors makes it possible for more social workers to assess needs and connect to resources, thanks to supporters like you.
